Message from the Interim Moderator Peter Murdoch

Dear Friends,

It is a great privilege to be appointed by Presbytery to be your Interim Moderator following the demission and retirement of Rev Murdo Campbell. I know you have thanked Murdo for his faithful ministry with you and I am sure that you would all join me in wishing God's richest blessing for Murdo and Lorraine as they embark on the next phase of their lives.

By the time this newsletter is published, I will have met many of you either in the Kirk Session or in the Sunday morning worship on 20th August. However please permit me to introduce myself and my role in coming months of your so -called "vacancy". "Vacancy" is a misleading term as the worship and missional life of the congregation will continue, and by God's grace, flourish in this interim period.

I am a retired medical doctor, a session clerk in Park Church Stirling, and an Elder in Presbytery and my responsibility, on behalf of Presbytery, as Interim Moderator, is to support your office-bearers and members through this period. I am delighted that the Rev John Wilson, already well known to and respected by many of you, will be your locum minister leading services most Sundays and is also providing pastoral care, supported by your office bearers.

The Presbytery's Mission Plan, already approved by the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland envisages a linkage of Strathblane Church with Killearn Church in the first instance. This would be an equal partnership of two active and similar congregations, definitely not a takeover of one by the other, but rather seeking to work out together how best to progress with a shared ministry in light of the national shortage of ordained ministers. An initial step already agreed is for a small group from Session to meet with counterparts in Killearn to discuss a mutually acceptable basis of linkage and also to meet with representatives of Presbytery. Any proposed agreement would then be voted on by both kirk sessions and congregations separately. We will try to ensure that members are fully informed of progress, but it may take a few months to sort out details. Please try to be patient.

Unless we seek God's guidance and strength in helping discern God's will and serving him faithfully in this congregation and parish, our efforts will come to naught so I would ask that we support and encourage each other in regular prayer.

Many of us find potential change and uncertainty challenging, and some of the proposed changes may cause anxiety and upset, but I pray that we might remain focused on the big picture, seeking to share God's Love and to God's Kingdom in our communities. In the words of the writer to the Hebrews, "let us throw off everything that hinders and the sin that so easily entangles. And run with perseverance the race marked out for us, fixing our eyes upon Jesus, the pioneer and perfecter of faith"

Please contact me if you have any concerns and I will do my best to address them.

Well. Since the last Cornerstone, so very much has happened hasn't it?

In the June Cornerstone, I was writing about the proposed linkage with Killearn Church as a future decision. One which we would be approaching, but quite slowly, with both Murdo, and Stuart Sharp in Killearn still being the ministers in their parishes for some time to come.

This all changed, of course, when Murdo indicated to Presbytery his desire to "demit" by mid August.

As I write this, the removal vans have left the manse, and so has our minister of the last six years.

We will all miss his quiet wisdom and gracious dealings with those in need of support in so many ways. He led us faithfully through the difficult days of the pandemic, delivering comfort to those who, during this anxious, and often lonely, period, so sorely missed the support of face to face worship with their church family. Many people have come up to me in the village to say what a good and kind man they found him to be, a living witness to God's love for all.

What we must do now, though, is look ahead with the knowledge, and faith, that God has a new plan for us all, and one that He knows is for our good. It is right for us to care about what the future might hold, but it is not right for us to be fearful; we know that our God oversees all, and knows our every worry, He will not ever let us down, we are safe under His care whatever that future holds.

In the first instance, it is perhaps important to write down what linkage IS so that there may be no worries about what it is NOT.

It is about equally linking two separate churches under one minister, learning from one another and working together in a mutually beneficial way. It is about learning new ways to remain two caring and vibrant church families within our own communities.

It is not about moving swiftly to a union of the two churches, it is not about one church taking over another, it is not about losing our buildings, or our individual identity.

We will be linked under one minister, but we will continue to reach out within our own communities, while also learning about one another's congregations.

There may come a time when, together, we feel that a union of the two churches may be the best way forward, but that time has not yet come.

A small group from Killearn and Strathblane has been set up to explore the basis of linkage, discussing practical solutions regarding services, the shared use of a minister, and how we can lean on one another for shared expertise. These groups will report to their Sessions and, in turn, update the congregation.

ANY decisions will only be finalised after the congregation has been consulted and balloted for their wishes.

This is an ongoing process, and nothing, so far, has been specifically discussed between these two groups. The first joint meeting is in the process of being organised, and there will be others to follow over the coming weeks.

Your elders are here at any time for you to contact about any concerns you may have.

We ask that each one of us holds in prayer the time ahead of us as we all seek to know what God's will is for our brothers and sisters, both here in Strathblane and also, in Killearn.

On your behalf, we bid a warm welcome to our Interim Moderator, Peter Murdoch, who has kindly given an insight into his role with us, and a brief but informative biography (page 2). We can be assured of his prayerful support throughout the next few weeks and months.

Peter is a new face for us, but we also welcome back a well loved, and well loved face as our locum minister. John Wilson has very graciously agreed to be our locum for the foreseeable future, and we remember his faithful ministry to us in previous times with great fondness. Welcome back John, and Elizabeth, it will be lovely to see you both Sunday by Sunday.

Presbytery Elder:

Eric Livingston has recently stepped down from the role of Presbytery Elder, and indeed from an active role in Session. He cites reasons of age, but he always looks perennially young to me, given that mischievous twinkle I often catch in his eye!

We thank him for his service to the Session and his willingness to preach when need arose, a willingness to use this gift, I hope will continue. While the caravan and family commitments call them away from time to time, we will hope still to enjoy Eric, and Margaret's presence with us in Sunday worship.

We are grateful, and pleased that Ian Mills has stepped into the role of Presbytery Elder and we wish him well as he takes on this responsibility. We know that he will have the prayers of Session and congregation to support him.

It is my privilege to be the locum in Strathblane. Like 6 years ago it is at a time of vacancy. The circumstances are slightly different at this time due to the Presbytery Plan. It is important that we realise that we are not alone as this happening throughout the Church of Scotland. We have to seek the way ahead by being united and working as a family of God's people. All of this appears devastating at the moment and we all have our own thoughts about it all.

Interestingly, in the news recently we saw the devastation in Hawaii. The news bulletin shared an interview with a member of a congregation whose church building was completely destroyed.

One lady said, "our building was destroyed completely but we are not finished; we will rebuild our church because our faith has not been destroyed."

The hymn writer put it well when he wrote:

*Jesus, stand among us at the meeting of our lives,
be our sweet agreement at the meeting of our eyes;*

*O Jesus, we love You, so we gather here,
join our hearts in unity and take away our fears.*

I, along with Elizabeth, will be with you to serve God and be your pastor. I am available to speak with you whenever you feel the need to talk to someone. I finish with a quotation from one of the speakers at this years Keswick Convention who said:

God loves you more than you can imagine and He wants you to know it.

Let us look forward in faith and He will be with us.

A Message from the King Ian Mills

I am sure a number of people in the congregation will know of someone who received a message from the late Queen Elizabeth. In my own family, there was great excitement at the time of my mother's 100th birthday when she received a card from the Queen. Also, both our granddaughters received a card after writing to the Queen on the occasion of her Golden Jubilee.

Recently, I received a message from the King – no, not King Charles 3, but Neptune-Rex on the occasion of 'Crossing the Equatorial Line'. There is a long standing maritime tradition whereby those sailors who are crossing the equator for the first time – known as the 'pollywogs' – are initiated by the 'shellbacks' who had previously experienced this passage. This tradition has now become a feature of entertainment on many cruise ships when crossing the equator. The pollywogs are summoned before King Neptune and his court to undergo their initiation ceremony which can include 'kissing the fish' or being 'baptised' in the pool. Thereafter they become 'shellbacks'. Fortunately, in my recent cruise experience, only members of the crew were involved and so the passengers were not obliged to go through this ritual – although a few brave souls did! I can now sail with an easy mind as according to my message from King Neptune, I have 'the freedom of the seas and all dwellers of the Deep will abstain from maltreating my person'. All taken in the spirit of innocent fun.

In the bible, there are numerous references to different Kings. In many cases they feature as part of the historical narrative of Old Testament kingdoms and tribes. Some Kings are well known eg Saul, David, Solomon. However, there are also references to the fact that both God and Jesus occupy a more significant status than all other Kings. The New Testament in particular states quite clearly (eg Paul in his first letter to Timothy), that Jesus is 'King of Kings and Lord of Lords'. Whilst the Old Testament may not use the exact phrase 'King of Kings and Lord of Lords', there are verses which recognise God's su-

preme rule: In the book of Daniel, King Nebuchadnezzar glorifies the 'King of Heaven' and in Chronicles, David praises God as 'Head over all'.

Many will be familiar with the famous Hallelujah Chorus from Handel's Messiah (based on Revelation 19.16), with the pivotal phrase 'And He shall reign forever and ever, Hallelujah! King of Kings and Lord of Lords'. Allegedly King George 2 was so moved by the music, that he stood up and of course the audience had to follow suit. Although some have challenged the reasons for the King standing, the tradition has carried on to this day.

During the recent Coronation of King Charles 3, the Archbishop of Canterbury reminded us that 'The King of Kings, Jesus Christ, was anointed to serve, not to be served'.

So how as Christians are we aware that we have received a message from The King? It will not be as obvious as receiving a card on the occasion of a 100th birthday. In the bible there are examples of God 'speaking' through a burning bush or a thick cloud, of Samuel hearing God call his name, of Saul's conversion on the Road to Damascus, to name but a few. There are various commentaries describing ways in which 'Messages from The King' are conveyed to us today: Some may be by pure chance as a reaction to hearing something, reading something, meeting somebody or by simply taking in the wonders of nature or the arts.

We can draw an analogy with the use of mobile phones, which if switched off all the time, will never register receipt of a message. Likewise, we too must be 'switched on' to receive a message from The King. Just as I now apparently have the freedom of the seas thanks to King Neptune, hopefully for those still in the pollywog state of receiving a 'Message from The King', there will be an opportunity to cross the Christian equatorial line to become a shellback and enjoy the freedom of communicating with The King of Kings.

On Thursday the 10th of August a good time was had by all as we said goodbye to our minister Murdo. We began with afternoon tea followed by a quiz with a Scottish theme. Later Tamara led us in singing a selection of Scottish songs, finishing with Lovely Stornoway. We thanked Murdo for his work over the last six years and presented him with a framed photograph of the Campsies by local photographer Stevi Jackson, and a box of chocolates. We will miss Murdo as he often popped in for a chat on Thursday afternoons.

Whilst the students and teachers are on summer holidays in Malawi until the new term starts on 11th September, work has started on phase 2 of Bright Futures Secondary School. The school opened initially with classrooms 1 and 2 but now the next class of students who pass their primary school leavers exams will need a classroom to continue their education.

These teenagers, without our support, would not have the opportunity to attend secondary school. As they all live in extreme poverty and most are orphans, their education would usually stop at the end of primary school as their families cannot afford the fees that need to be paid for secondary school.

Bright Futures Secondary School is providing free secondary education for the most vulnerable students. They are also receiving a free cooked meal each lunchtime. For most of the students, this is their only meal each day. Education is the best way to escape extreme poverty and have a better and brighter future with choices and chances.

Foundations have been laid and filled, bricks have been made and fired and the walls are being built. However, we haven't reached our target yet, and would be very grateful if anyone would like to donate towards the school project. PS Hot off the press!! Exciting news! All our S2 students passed their national exams! 100% pass which is amazing – we are so proud of them. Please help ensure they have a classroom and textbooks next term.

Yvonne Mildred: In Sandema they are now in the middle of the planting season, with every family around growing their food for the coming year. The rains started two months late, in June, so the harvesting of the first crop, was missed by most families. Some say the rains have never been this late before, and this is caused by global warming. As the Harvest season progresses from November to January, we will learn how severe or not the shortages are.



At Zurugalu, the building for receiving, washing and cutting the vegetables, they are putting up the trusses for the roof on the second building, and the zinc roofing sheets have been delivered. Thanks be to God that the electrical contractor has planted all the poles now, and continue to wait for the metal clamps that attach the cables to the poles.

Recently Yvonne has been enjoying arranging 31 Bible meditations for business people to use as daily devotions in a month (she is not the original author). These will be recorded and made available to people involved in the Discipling Marketplace Leaders Ministries in several countries. There are also 7 memory verses for business people who are oral learners to pray through weekly. Yvonne prays that they do encourage Christian business people to walk closely with God in their businesses daily.



Yvonne does have some free time. here she is at a dedication of a Vocational Training Centre, where she was requested to join the local dancers.

Lorna Ferguson is back in Japan after celebrating the wedding of her eldest son Daniel to Yada in Thailand. Having completed 25 years in Japan she is frequently called upon for advice and help. Lately it has felt like a spiritual battle. There has been one difficult challenge after another, each one requiring quite a bit of work and a lot of wisdom and discernment. But she has been encouraged by the arrival of new members to the missionary team whom she welcomed at Tokyo airport before spending a day with them doing some orientation. Then a week was passed in the north of Honshu supporting some missionary church leaders. In September she will be involved in the Japanese Congress of Evangelism where around 1,000 Christian leaders will gather. Her thoughts too will have been with her son Callum who has been in Scotland, seeking to promote his football ambitions.



It's a big change for **Carolyn Kemp** from her early days as a missionary in the discomfort and health hazards of the shanty towns of Manila. Recently in the comfort of her base in Fife, sometimes in person, sometimes by Zoom at all hours, she has directed her Diaspora colleagues who engage with (mainly) Asians who, while studying in the West, become Christians and then return to their homelands where they need continuing care, support and encouragement. Now, after 12 years at the helm, Carolyn has stepped down and awaits the next assignment.



James and Kirsty (with Deborah and Susanna) after 16 years in SE Asia, latterly in Hong Kong under the watchful eyes of the authorities, have moved to Edinburgh and have taken on Carolyn's job. They have spent a week in Stuttgart at the Diaspora European Conference where they had the opportunity to meet some of their workers in Europe and will be keen to get to know their other widespread colleagues in US, Canada, Kenya and beyond.

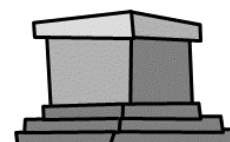
